

Weipa Town Authority (WTA) respectfully acknowledges the Traditional Custodians of the land, the Alngith People and we pay our respects to Elders past and present, and to the young emerging leaders. We also extend our acknowledgment to all the Aboriginal members of the Anathanguyth, Ankamuthi, Peppan, Taepadhighi, Thanikwithi, Tjungundji, Warranggu, Wathayn, Wik and Wik-Waya and Yupangthi Traditional Owner groups, of this Western Cape region.

Weipa is a vibrant, sustainable coastal community of approximately 4,500 residents, located at Albatross Bay on the west coast of Cape York Peninsula, in the Gulf of Carpentaria. The township sits around 200km from Australia's northern tip and roughly 800km from Cairns by road (or 1.5 hours flying time by air). Despite the distance from other major cities, Weipa Township serves as the regional hub for the Western Cape York Region and contains all the facilities and conveniences of modern living.

On average, Weipa receives 2,051mm of rain annually, with 97% of that falling in the wet season (December – March). Average temperatures are between 19° C and 36° C all year round.

Rich in both natural beauty and cultural heritage, this region features stunning beaches, unspoiled wilderness and unrivaled fishing making Weipa the ideal base to explore the Cape's many attractions. Home to several different Traditional Owner groups, each contributing to the unique diversity of the area.

WTA acts in the role of Local Council for the Weipa Town Area on behalf of RTA Weipa Pty Ltd (Rio Tinto).

The services supplied and maintained through the WTA are those supplied by local councils throughout Australia, including road maintenance, water supply, town planning, garbage collection, parks, ovals, sporting facilities, library and an aquatic centre.

The Weipa region is extremely rich in bauxite, with much of the surrounding land around the township leased to the mining company Rio Tinto. Rio Tinto Weipa is a major contributor to the regional economy, making significant investments in local infrastructure.


Rio Tinto owns and operates the Weipa bauxite mine, holding three leases that span 3.860 square km of western Cape York.

RTA Weipa Pty Ltd governs the Weipa Town Area and can exercise certain powers and rights of a Local Council by virtue of the Commonwealth Aluminium Corporation Pty Limited Agreement Act 1957 (Qld) and the Comalco Aluminium Corporation Pty Ltd Agreement.

It is my pleasure to submit to you the Weipa Town Authority Annual Report for 2021–22.

While the threat of COVID-19 has started to diminish and become a part of our everyday normal, the ripple effects of the virus' impact on our business community have started to be felt. The difficulty in attracting staff to a remote the shortages of qualified people due to the reopening of the borders, has only been amplified. When you add to that the difficulty in securing materials for projects along with the increased costs of those materials, it has been a challenging period for sure.

This has required WTA to continue to be flexible in addressing these challenges and yet still deliver to the Weipa community services they are entitled to.

Maintenance of essential infrastructure is ongoing, with the completion of the second stage of the Trunding Water Mains project. We continue to apply for funding for projects like the design of the John Evans and the McLeod Drive shared pathways. The program of installing more solar lights throughout the town and improving facilities is ongoing.

The project that was the primary focus of WTA in 2021-22 was finalising the construction of the WASP sports complex and, after the opening in October, staffing and running the facility. There has been a huge learning curve in ensuring we achieve the full potential this infrastructure has to offer and deliver the maximum benefit to the community.

Despite the challenging economic environment, we still saw the incredible spirit of the people of Weipa through their devoted support of the many community events; along with the efforts of our incredible community region like ours has always been challenging but now, with volunteers who continue to provide great events like Weipa Fishing Classic and Weipa Bull Ride.

> With another huge tourist season this year, the demand for the facilities in Weipa was stretched but our tourist businesses rose to the challenge to accommodate this demand.

Thankfully, we didn't see any cyclone activity in our region during the wet season even though we had a long wet, which is always welcome.

The next 12 months will present their own set of challenges but the members and staff at WTA are committed to continue providing the high level of services needed.

OPENING OF THE WEIPA AQUATIC SPORTING PRECINCT (WASP)

The construction and opening of the Weipa Aquatic and Sports Precinct was a flagship adjacent to the Weipa Town Authority office was transformed from 'back in the day' public tennis courts into a state-of-the-art recreation centre for the Weipa community.

Planning and community consultation commenced in mid-2018 with construction commencing in early 2019 overseen by WTA and a project management team.

The WASP was officially opened on 11th September 2021 by Michelle Elvy, General Manager Rio Tinto Weipa; Michael Rowland, Chairperson Weipa Town Authority and our very own Australian Tennis Champion Evonne Goolagong Cawley.

The Weipa community embraced a festival feeling and saw over 200 people come to celebrate this momentous occasion. Partnerships with local businesses and community groups as well as Tennis Australia and Medibank Private offered numerous activities including Speed Serve area, smoothie bikes, giveaways and games to bring the WASP to and wellness.

The architecturally designed facility features 3 professional-grade tennis courts with lights, project for 2021-2022. Following the receipt of \$13M grant funding from Rio Tinto, the area 3 squash courts, a netted indoor pitch for cricket and soccer, a fully equipped gymnasium/ fitness centre, yoga/dance studio, creche, kiosk as well as accessible bathroom and change room facilities.

> Along with the new facility, the WASP encompasses the existing Storm Surge Shelter and Weipa Aquatic Centre to provide a one-stop membership and centralised facility booking service for all WTA managed community venues.

> The WASP provides employment for over 20 people within the Weipa community and has seen a steady uptake of memberships since its opening.

Future planning for the WASP includes increasing group fitness classes, working more closely with local sporting and community groups to utilise the facilities and broadening the role of the facility to incorporate healthy towns initiatives for holistic community health





















DISASTER MANAGEMENT

COVID-19 was still our primary focus in Cape York with the threat from Papua New Guinea filtering through the Torres Strait on to the Cape a real possibility. In July 2021 the San Yu ore ship was enroute from Manilla to Cape Flattery when six crew fell sick with COVID-19 and the ship was diverted to Weipa anchorage offshore. The handling of the patients, crew and ship was nothing but exceptional from transferring the patients from the ship to mainland to airport and airlift to Brisbane whilst also maintaining the safety and operations of the ship. The total management of this was recognised by Maritime Safety and became the benchmark for handling all ships worldwide.

29 December 2021 saw the first confirmed community transmission cases of COVID-19. This elevated us to the highest level of activation which we stayed at until May 4 2022.

2022 brought us into the phase of the COVID-19 pandemic that we have all been working so hard towards. That is 'Living with COVID'. After a couple of years of social distancing, washing our hands, covering our cough and wearing a mask when indoors or when you can't socially distance it actually started to become normal. Restrictions were relaxed during the year as across the region, state and country everyone was more aware of their surroundings and habits.

In relation to the weather we did not dip as deep into La Nina as all the indicators were showing. We had just above average rainfall with nil activations for tropical disturbances. We did watch a couple of Lows develop but they posed no threat to us. There were four Tropical Cyclones in our region that also posed no threat.

Disaster Management is not just about cyclones although they are our biggest factor living in North Queensland. If you wish to be involved there are a number of community groups that you can get involved with like SES, VMR, Rural Fire Brigade and the Storm Surge Shelter volunteer staffing group.

The Weipa Local Disaster Management Group would like to thank the communities of the Western Cape and our neighboring Disaster Management Groups for our ongoing collaborative approach to Disaster Management. A special note of thank you to Torres and Cape Hospital and Health Service for their leadership in working with us and all agencies through this pandemic.

SES LOCAL DISASTER COORDINATION CENTRE

The State Emergency Service Headquarters is a multipurpose building fit to accommodate the SES and Western Cape Rural Fire Services. The facility will also become the new location for the local disaster coordination centre. To support the facility in being able to adequately operate 24/7 as an emergency services precinct, a generator was added to the building. In the event of a power failure, the generator will provide emergency backup power by aiding power to the communication towers; repairing, charging vehicles and equipment, and allowing for the coordination of disaster response and recovery. Allowing the building to stand independently from the main electrical grid is crucially important during the cyclone season to ensure the facility can still operate at full capacity.

Total cost was \$71,145 (ex GST). The WTA was very fortunate to receive \$35,572.50 from the Queensland Resilience and Risk Fund (QRRRF) 2021-22 towards this important resilience project. The installation of the generator was completed on 7th April 2022.

Geoff Wharton

The Cape York Collection is an archival and research collection situated in the Hibberd Library.


Established in 1980, the Collection is funded by WTA. It includes archives, audio-visual materials, books, journals, newspapers and photographic collections relating to the Cape York Peninsula region.

During the year, honorary curator Geoff Wharton, has been digitising some of the albums and slide collections and preparing finding aids to assist library customers. One of the remarkable photographic collections is a set of slides created by the late W.C. (Bill) Wentworth and his wife Barbara showing scenes and people during an overland trip in 1962 from Cairns to the Northern Peninsula Area and across to Weipa by Land Rover. This was 20 years before such journeys became popular and the roads were just basic tracks through the bush and along the Cape York telegraph line. Bill Wentworth was a long-term Commonwealth parliamentarian and the first Minister for Aboriginal Affairs (1968–1971). The acquisition of duplicates of these slides occurred as a result of a chance meeting with the Wentworths at the Coen races in 1983.

Many of the low level bridges on the Peninsula were constructed from adzed logs laid roughly across creek crossings.

Among the photographic treasures digitised during the year was an album of monochrome photographs entitled Weipa Bauxite Mining Expansion 1964-1967, which was donated in 1984 by Allan Young, a former General Manager – Weipa Operations. This album features photographs of the first houses being built in Awonga Court in 1965, construction of the bauxite beneficiation plant and other facilities at Lorim Point, including the export shiploader







The Northern Avenue Shared Pathway project was developed to provide a walkway along Northern Avenue.

The pathway is a 2.5-metre-wide pedestrian and bicycle path stretching for 1,400 metres along Northern and Central Avenues. The path allows for safe school routes and linkages to employment and homes. Pedestrian bridges and adequate water run off gutters were also engineered and installed to ensure maximum enjoyment and useability of the pathway.

In the last couple of years, the northern area of Rocky Point has expanded to include a new church, housing, and a motel. This has increased the traffic flow, both on foot and by car. For the safety of the community, the pathway was created to connect to the existing pathway along Central Avenue. The pathway runs from the school crossing on Central Avenue to the intersection of Northern Avenue and Andoom Road.

The total cost of the project was \$724,024 with \$362,012 in support from the Queensland Government's Cycle Network Local Government Grants Program. The project commenced in 2019 and was completed on 13th December 2021.



Weipa Town Authority actively supports local groups and organisations that provide programs, activities, events and projects that enhance community wellbeing, build capacity and enrich the diversity of social, sport, cultural and economic opportunities for residents.

Grants awarded for the year totalled \$32,864.


STATEMENT OF PROFIT OR LOSS AND OTHER COMPREHENSIVE INCOME

REVENUE

WTA received a total of \$8,278,225 in revenue and other income during the 2021-22 financial year.

Total revenue has increased by \$393,219 between this financial year and last financial year. This is the result of an increase in town rates based on annual land valuation data (undertaken by the State Valuation Service).

Rates and charges

Rates and charges attribute to the majority of the WTA revenue at 90%. This is the primary funding stream that enables the WTA to complete the day to day operations throughout Weipa town. This annual total of \$7.5m includes general rates and also utility rates which fund maintenance of the water and sewer infrastructure, as well as garbage collections.

Grants & donations

This total refers to operating grants & donations only, not capital funding. The annual total of \$150k attributed 2% of the total WTA revenue for 2021–22. The total includes donations received that are passed on to local organisations such as SES, as well as the amortisation of grants received for infrastructure works from the State Government.

Fees & charges revenue

Attributing to 6% of the total WTA revenue, fees & charges are an important revenue stream for the town to operate. Fees & charges include revenue from the aquatic centre & other facilities that the town has for hire, such as the Weipa Storm Surge Shelter. Revenue from animal registrations & the pound are also included in this total, as well as regulatory items such as rates searches, trade waste, town planning and building inspections. 
ANNUAL REPORT 2021-2022

EXPENDITURE

The WTA's total expenditure for the 2021-22 financial year was \$8,312,185.

Total expenditure has increased by \$753,300 between this financial year and last. This can be mainly attributed to the expanded Weipa Aquatic and Sports Precinct (WASP) activities, which led to increases in various expense categories, being by far most notable in payroll expenses.

Pavroll

Payroll attributed to 33% of the WTA's total expenditure for 2021–22. This expenditure includes wages, salaries, WTA Member remuneration, and superannuation. The WTA maintains a strong workforce, providing services for the community such as public works, projects, water treatment, water storage & distribution, sewer collection & treatment, maintenance of roads & stormwater drainage, town planning functions, building certifications & inspections, disaster management, food licencing, environmental health, garbage collection, events (such as movie nights, Australia day, Rhyme Time at the library), aquatic centre, animal control, local laws, finance, governance & grants, administration, sports & recreation activities and services (i.e. school holiday programs, playgrounds, footpaths, ovals & fitness equipment). In addition the WASP facilities, with related services expanded the range of services to the community in a most notable and beneficial way.

Other materials and services

Other materials and services attributed to 3% of the WTA's total expenditure. Totalling \$229k for the financial year, this included expenditure for the external testing of the town water on a twice weekly basis, grants to community user groups for specific projects as detailed in their applications, cleaning of the WTA facilities available for public hire and use (i.e. public toilets, house on the hill, assembly hall).

Contractors

Contractor expenditure equated to 16% of the total WTA expenditure this financial year. The majority of these costs are maintaining the grounds, parks and gardens around the town. The garbage collection services are also operated by a contractor so the town collection costs also fall under this category as well as a variety of other smaller contracts.

Electricity

Electricity attributed to 3% of the expenditure. The cost of electricity covers all aspects of town services, including street lights, community facilities, aquatic centre, irrigation, and operation of the sewer and water pump stations.

Repairs & maintenance

Repairs and maintenance attributed to 11% of the WTA's total expenditure for 2021–22. These works are varied throughout the town and include maintenance on roads, footpaths, drainage, as well as water and sewer mains, valve audits and irrigation repairs. The costs for emergency call outs for water and sewer leaks are also included in this category.

General expenses

General expenses amounted to 13% and totalled \$1,070k this financial year. These costs cover general operations for the aquatic centre (i.e. gas for the pumps, chlorine and consumables), general expenses for parks and gardens around the town (i.e. tree trimming & tree removal), general consumables in the library and the storm surge for school holiday activities and general craft, and also expenditure towards event preparation and rollout.

OPERATING POSITION


The WTA's operating position reflects the organisation's ability to meet its day-to-day running costs from operating revenue.

The WTA's operating position as at 30 June 2022 is a marginal loss of \$33,960. This is a notable difference from the surplus of \$326,121 in the 2020-21 financial year. This changed position can mostly be attributed to the additional cost introduced by the expanded WASP activities.

The operating position is calculated by taking the WTA's total operating expense (\$8,312,185) from total operating revenue (\$8,278,225). It does not include revenue or expenditure amounts for capital projects.



The WTA assets totalled \$16m at the end of 2021-22 financial year, this represents a 1% increase on the total assets in 2020-21.

Current assets have decreased in this financial year due to decreased cash at bank compared to the prior financial year. The decrease was due to investment in non-current (fixed) assets.



The WTA liabilities totalled \$5.7m at the end of the 2021-22 financial year, this represents a 5% increase on the total liabilities in 2020-21.

Current liabilities includes trade & other payables which have increased by \$114k compared with the previous year. Current liabilities also includes revenue in advance, which is \$151K. The total liabilities balance is primarily income in advance for capital grants which are amortised over the useful life of the asset once the projects are completed. In the 2021-22 year, new grants received outweighed amortisation of completed projects which is why it has increased. (Amortisation being the process of gradually writing off the initial cost of an asset).
